A Letter from our CEO

We exist because of our community and for our community. This year, we have seen another dramatic increase in food bank use, homelessness, substance use, mental health challenges, and other critical issues that point to a region - and a world in crisis. Through it all, United Way WRC has remained steadfast in our commitment to equity and compassion.

The launch and stewardship of the Government of Canada's Community Services Recovery fund was a major highlight of 2023. Through United Way Centraide Canada's leadership, our national network successfully distributed more than \$100 million in funding. Locally, we were able to distribute over \$1.7 million dollars in support.

At a provincial level, we worked together with United Way partners to lead an inquiry into the housing crisis and solicited the input of nearly 100 local experts to present recommendations in an expert report: Bringing Affordable Housing Home.

As we continue to direct our funding locally, we work in partnership with United Ways across the country to advocate for everyone we serve.

We saw increased attendance at all our events this year and thoroughly enjoyed being able to connect in person with our friends and neighbours. Through our network, we are matching non-profit needs with individuals and organizations able to lend a hand.

In the following pages, we are honoured to share these and other highlights from this past year. As we look back, we learn and grow. We are inspired to innovate and lead forward. To keep moving.

Territorial Acknowledgement

Waterloo Region Communities is our home, built on native land. The land we live and work on is part of the Haldimand Tract, granted to the Haudenosaunee (Ho-den-o-show-nee) of the Six Nations of the Grand River, and are within the traditional territories of the Anishinaabe (Ah-nish-nah-bey) and Chonnonton (Chi-nawn-ton) peoples. The original stewards of these lands have been Indigenous peoples for millennia, and we are grateful for their deep traditional knowledge, philosophies, and contributions.

We offer this territorial acknowledgment as an action step towards reconciliation and as a demonstration of our commitment to restorative practices and systemic change which are required to achieve equity.

At United Way WRC, we support change and are committed to unlearning and relearning, listening, and acknowledging the ways our own practices harm others, reinforce systemic racism, or contribute to the legacy of colonialism. We are all treaty people and seek to continue our work building a future based on principles of justice, equity, and respect.





To eliminate poverty, discrimination, and injustice, we commit to removing inequitable barriers in our community work and internal practices. Our history of colonialism, systemic racism, and other oppressions has caused harm, leading to long-term disparities for marginalized groups, including Indigenous, Black, Racialized, 2SLGBTQIA+, and persons with differing abilities.

At United Way WRC, we strive to provide and promote equitable and inclusive access to resources and opportunities. We listen to the community and aim to address and remove attitudes, policies, and practices that cause oppression. Through intentional work, we aspire to create conditions for everyone to thrive.

We are dedicated to changing our organization's policies and practices that exclude and oppress. We work closely with individuals and organizations to uplift, fostering partnerships through open funding opportunities and transparent resource distribution. Addressing systemic inequities is essential to ending poverty in our community.

Using the principles of reconciliation and equity, we will make measurable changes to eliminate systemic racism and discrimination, demonstrating our commitment to fighting poverty in all its forms.

A Letter from our Board Chair


It's no secret that charitable fundraising is challenging, especially in the current economic climate. I often get asked, why United Way? Why not another worthy charity or community organization?

Issue Areas of Focus



Community Impact Fund: Giving to the Community Impact Fund allows the Community Investment Team to direct funding, with a lens of equity and inclusion, to the programs they deem most critical.



Affordable Housing & Homelessness: Critical emergency shelters, street-level outreach, supportive and transitional housing, and reducing evictions.



Food Insecurity: Emergency food, access to fresh, healthy food, after-school, weekend and summer school food supports, community meals, and food preparation programs.



Mental Health & Addictions: Specialized supports addressing trauma, one-to-one counselling, group counselling, culturally appropriate counselling, addiction treatment, and education.



Children & Youth: Overall health and well-being of our community's young people through counselling, mentorship, tutoring, leadership, and volunteer opportunities.



Literacy, Employment Skills & Assistive Devices: Basic life skills, literacy and numeracy skill building, homework help, tutoring and family support for newcomers, technological skills and providing assistive devices for people living with disabilities.



Hate, Gender-Based & Family Violence: Support for victims of violence, crime, and discrimination with awareness building and community education.



Leadership, Volunteerism & Capacity Building: Leadership skill development, support for volunteerism, organization capacity development, and collaboration between service providers.



Community & Social Supports: Reduce isolation and loneliness through programs like neighbourhood community development, senior support, and removing barriers to participation in the community.



Innovation & Systems Change: Problem-solving through technology, building capacity, and actualizing new programs and partnerships to create better opportunities to move our community forward.

Endowment Funds

Forever Fund grants, generated by an endowment fund, are used to support programs and initiatives within Waterloo Region. Grants are available in the following two investment streams:



Endowment Funds

The Tomorrow Fund

The Tomorrow Fund was established to serve the needs of the Cambridge and North Dumfries communities. Currently the fund addresses emerging or long-term community needs through new or innovative programs or initiatives that address capacity building and long-term sustainability.



Specialized Funds

United For Youth: Youth Impact Project

United Way WRC has committed \$300,000, over three years, to Smart Waterloo Region Innovation Lab (SWRIL) to deliver training and fund youth inspired projects through children and youth serving community organizations. The training will help develop a community-wide framework to support youth innovation and compassion with the goal of improving child and youth wellbeing. United for Youth aspires to empower and support the youth of our region as leaders and change-makers. Children and youth, equipped with a unique perspective, perceive community issues through distinct lens, fostering innovative and diverse solutions to community issues.









Community Services Recovery Fund (CSRF)

The Community Services Recovery Fund is a one-time investment of \$400 million by the Government of Canada to help Community Service Organizations, charities, non-profits, and Indigenous governing bodies located in Canada. This funding is in partnership with Community Foundations of Canada, United Way Centraide Canada, and the Canadian Red Cross.

United Way Waterloo Region Communities (UWWRC) and Waterloo Region Community Foundation (WRCF) worked together as part of this initiative to distribute \$3,000,000 million in funding to support 64 projects across Waterloo Region










